COURSE DESCRIPTION:

In this seminar course we shall explore certain key views of faith, work, and economics that have surfaced in the Christian tradition and we shall consider major biblical teaching on this theme, giving consideration especially to Genesis, Exodus, the Prophetic tradition and Luke/Acts.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- To encourage students to explore biblical teaching regarding faith, work, and economics.
- To expose students to significant voices and views currently shaping engagement with the issues of faith, work, and economics from a Christian perspective.
- To encourage students to begin developing a Christian posture toward issues related to faith, work and economics and how these might inform and shape preaching, church life, and mission.
