Course Description

This course explores how the biblical narrative brings renewed meaning to work and the workplace. This class studies the dignity and difficulty experienced in the workplace, along with the eschatological significance of human vocation. This course combines theory and practice by integrating a rigorously biblical worldview into the daily experiences of the workplace. The course is designed to explore the mission and calling of work in both 'sacred' and 'secular' vocations as the work of Christian ministry.

- 1. Articulate the intersection between creation and vocation
- 2. Formulate a biblical theology of work.
- 3. Assess how work engenders human flourishing.
- 4. Explain the importance of biblical wisdom in vocation.
- 5. Engage work and the workplace as ministry.

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Course Requirements:

In this three credit hour course, the professor expects each student to dedicate two hours outside of class for every hour in class a total of 112.5 hours (6,750 minutes) toward the mastery of the course content. The time is divided as follows:

- Work <u>inside</u> the classroom includes listening to lectures, taking notes, and interacting with the professor and other students comprises 37.5 hours (2,250 minutes).
- Work <u>outside</u> the classroom includes required reading, researching, analyzing and writing papers, preparing for and taking exams, and reviewing PowerPoint and lecture materials accounts for 75 hours (4,500 minutes).

Vocational Research Project, or Book Review

Assignment Description:

The student can conduct a 10 week vocation project, or write a formal research paper with at least 10 scholarly sources. Students are also free to explore other creative ideas that meet graduate level academic expectations in consultation with the professor(s).
